Broadband

I am on the planning committee and presenting at the regional workshops.

Maximize the Impact of BEAD Funding: Planning and Partnering Toward Internet for All – Extension is organizing four regional two-day workshops across Wisconsin. Day One of these workshops covers various topics, including the role of local government in broadband, data-driven economic storytelling, insights into workforce development, and effective public-private partnerships for broadband expansion. Day Two continues with discussions on county financing options and legal considerations in broadband deployment. This event offers valuable strategies for leveraging BEAD funding to ensure equitable internet access. Workshops will be in Rice Lake on September 6-7; in Tomah on September 28-29; in Fond du Lac on October 9-10; and in Rhinelander on October 25-26.

Community Garden

Extension received \$4,000 from Indianhead Community Action Agency (ICAA) for refurbishment and maintenance of the Community Garden. Compost, lumber, garden tools and lawn care equipment, as well as repairs to water valves were purchased utilizing these funds.

StrongPeople/Strong Bodies

The Strong Bodies program starts September 11th in 5 locations throughout Taylor County, Gilman, Goodrich, Medford, Rib Lake and Online. I am just wrapping up the coordination of marketing materials, advertising, and supplies to start the classes. This Fall, I will conduct an evaluation on each instructor to meet the requirements of the Statewide program.

NACCA Annual Meeting

In August, Sandy joined approximately 700 colleagues from 49 states and three US territories for the National Association of County Agricultural Agents (NACAA) Annual Meeting and Professional Improvement Conference (AM-PIC) in Des Moines, IA. She greeted poster session attendees where she and her WI team received Professional Development in Applied Research Regional Winner recognition for their research, Beef x Dairy Crossbreeding and calf Management Practices on Wisconsin Dairy Farms. The poster summarizes the dairy farm survey conducted in 2022 about general farm production of beef x dairy calves: sire and dam selection, breeding results, newborn calf management, milk feeding practices, and marketing. From the results, we have identified colostrum management practices and transfer of passive immunity for beef x dairy crossbred calves as areas of future study. In September, she and her team submitted the research project for publication with the double-blind, scientific peer-reviewed Journal of NACAA.

Sandy also received NACAA's Communication Regional Winner recognition for her feature article, VCPR - Now More important Than Ever for the Wisconsin Agriculturist Magazine (Farm Progress magazine group). Sandy and Heather Schlesser, Extension Marathon County, also received NACAA's Communication National Finalist award for Learning Module/Notebook with their Artificial Insemination Program.

Day Camps

Taylor County 4-H had campers participate in the Day Camps at Wood Lake, Medford School Forest, Diamond Lake, and Stetsonville. Emma and I taught them the Friendship Wish (May all I think, say, and do, not hurt anyone, and help everyone!) in ASL. Each week I engaged the youth in a 4-H program based around their theme for the week. Our favorite was the experiments we did together during STEAM week (catapult and chemical reactions).
