Strategic Plan Update:

These are the four areas that the Strategic Plan Committee is working on.

- What can Taylor County Government do to attract and retain experienced, knowledgeable staff to provide excellent service to the community?
- What can Taylor County Government do to improve public relations and communication, both internally and externally, in the next 3-5 years?
- How can Taylor County Government develop strategies to enhance fiscal resilience?
- What can Taylor County Government do to improve government efficiency and operational effectiveness in the next 3 to 5 years?

During the June meeting, **Michelle worked with the committee to begin developing action plans to address these issues.** Action planning will be finalized likely in July. The entire strategic plan will be presented to the county board for review/endorsement in late summer early fall.

Gilman CEA:

Gilman will be visiting Mellen, WI on June 19th to compare what has worked in the CEA (Community Economic Analysis) to what is occurring in Mellen. **They hope to identify best practices from Mellen initiatives that could help Gilman reach its CEA objectives.**



A good portion of Michelle's time during spring was coordinating for another year the development of the community garden. Below is a picture of the garden with replaced beds. Besides the gardeners, Michelle once again involved special needs youth and other community volunteers in the development of this year's garden. A good portion of the produce will be donated to local food pantries.

2024 Clean Sweep collected a total of 51,276 lbs. of electronics this year from 487 participants. Also collected were 331 appliances, 115 gallons of waste oil, and 32 batteries from 244 vehicles.

Sandy's programming includes writing about livestock management and being interviewed about farming practices. These articles keep livestock producers and the public up to date with local and regional livestock news, market trends, and current production practices, including ideas to help increase the economic viability of producers. Examples include:

- The Wisconsin Agriculturist Magazine includes articles by the Division of Extension educators. As part of its monthly Beef Column, Sandy wrote **Why Adding Cattle to Your Herd is Risky** for the February 2024 print issue which summarized steps producers should take as they bring new cattle onto their operations. Herd additions have inherent risks. Every movement of cattle onto a cow-calf operation brings biosecurity risks to the farm. The article also appeared in the magazine's December 19, 2023, online edition. The WI Agriculturist circulation is 24,000 print subscribers. The Beef Columns also appear on their website and garner between 1,000- and 4,000-page views (it is different for every column).
- Division of Extension beef educators provide articles for the WI Cattlemen's Association quarterly newsletter. Sandy wrote My Farm is Infected with a FAD, Now What? For the March edition of the newsletter. This article included links to three biosecurity videos Sandy and her colleagues created in collaboration with the WI Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP). FAD is a foreign animal disease, and the article proved timely as producers received it just as news about dairy cattle infected with avian influenza was being reported nationally. Cattle Trails is distributed to 121 members and 18 affiliate members for a total of 139 (130 receive digital and hard copies. and nine requested to only receive digital). Equity Livestock Cooperative also receives 120 hard copies to distribute among their sale barns.
- The WI State Farmer newspaper includes the UW-Extension Corner in its weekly edition. Sandy
 wrote How are Wisconsin Beef Producers Meeting Consumer Demand? which was
 published in the May 17, 2024, issue. This article described why previous Governors proclaimed,

'May is Beef Month' and how beef producers meet consumers' desire for wholesome, healthy beef. The *WI State Farmer* newspaper circulation is 10,000. Traffic on their website, depending on the articles - can range from 1,000 to 20,000 views or more.

• A reporter for the Medford *Star News* interviewed Sandy for a June Dairy Month feature he was writing for the paper, and its sister paper, the *Tribune-Phonograph*. He was looking for background information about farming trends and farmer's use of artificial intelligence in Taylor County. Sandy met with the reporter in person, and he subsequently wrote **The Futuristic**Present: Dairy Technology which was published in the June 6 editions of the *Star News* and *Tribune-Phonograph* newspapers. His article included quotes from the farmers Sandy referred to along with her statements about artificial insemination technology and the current landscape of dairy farming in the Taylor County area. The circulation for *Star News* is 4,200 and 1,700 for the *Tribune-Phonograph*.





Planning Emergency Livestock Transport Response Facilitator's Guide

This training is intended for first responders, including dispatchers, fire, law enforcement, EMS, county emergency management, public health and safety communicators, governmental administrative, veterinarians and others (including those experienced in handling cattle, sheep and goats, pigs, and horses) who may provide support, assistance or aid in responding to roadway incidents involving cattle, sheep and goats, pigs and horses.

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Sandy's written materials have been selected as National Finalists for the National Association of County Agricultural Agents (NACAA) Communications Awards. She will find out if they have been selected as National Winners during July's NACAA Professional Improvement Conference in Dallas, TX.

Huey's Hideaway




Taylor County 4-H partners with Huey's Hideaway Children's Museum during the summer by providing a 4-H program weekly to the youth in attendance. The youth enroll in 4-H through a simplified form as a member of the Huey's Summer 4-H Club. Youth learn the 4-H pledge and participate in a variety of programs that go along with their theme for the week. So far, we have conducted programs on "Going Green" - we talked about how green is the 4-H color and helped the youth weed the flower beds and plant peas. We have also presented programs on Fairy Tales and the Olympics.

This is a great opportunity to introduce youth to 4-H projects as well as skills and activities the 4-H program offers.

Plat Books 2024

The Taylor County Plat Book is one of the major fundraisers for the Federation of Taylor County 4-H. All proceeds from the plat book sales stay local to benefit our 4-H program. - FoodWlse Educator, Shara Allen, finished teaching a series of 6 nutrition education classes
 to the Medford Head Start students in May. Lessons included hands-on activities,
 reading of a book, and a taste test of nutritious food items that were new to the majority
 of the students. The 13 children were very interested in the lessons and the staff have been
 very supportive, incorporating information from FoodWlse lessons into their own lessons and
 activities. Head Start would like to be a part of another series of classes in the 2024/25 school
 year.
- FoodWlse is an active member of the Taylor County Coalition and Supporting Healthy Aging
 Coalition and are attending meetings regularly. This serves as a great opportunity to develop
 and strengthen partnerships for current and future programming opportunities with
 other agencies and organizations.
- Shara Allen completed a Mental Health First Aid training in May. This hybrid class consisted of 2 in-person sessions and online work. The goal of the class is to educate one on how to recognize the signs and symptoms of someone experiencing a mental health challenge and how best to connect that person with support. The training was offered through UW-Extension for the public.
- Shara Allen completed her UW-Extension Foundations in Extension Education training. This 6
 month/12 session hybrid course is designed to inform new employees about the resources
 available for their roles in teaching, learning, leading and serving the people of WI. By
 connecting fellow colleagues via in-person and on-line sessions, connections were made,
 techniques were shared, and procedures were practiced.
- Conversations about programming at the Medford Food Pantry are on-going. Recipes
 and how-to cook guides for produce donated from the Medford Community Garden are
 currently being designed for distribution in July and August.



Summer programming at Gilman and Rib Lake senior centers is being developed.
 Nutrition information, recipes, and samples of in-season produce will be made available to the seniors.
